come from a small office on King Edward Avenue in 1960. We also continued to look ahead to the future needs of Ottawa's youth.

YSB's Downtown Drop-in, a haven for street-involved youth, underwent major renovations withsupportfromthecommunity and the federal and provincial governments. YSB's mental health services also got a new home: the YSB Youth Mental Health Hub officially opened in January, bringing YSB's mental health team together to be even more effective, and opening the innovative new Mental Health Walk-In Clinic for youth and their families.

YSB's employment services were transformed this year as well. YSB was one of a select

group of agencies chosen by Employment Ontario to provide seamless services to the jobseeking public. And YSB's youth justice services marked a first by helping to organize a hugely successful Ottawa conference on the intersection between mental health and youth justice.

To mark YSB's 50th anniversary, YSB hosted a forum called Building Bridges, where YSB staff from across all program areas and the community shared expertise on the challenges for youth transitioning to adulthood.

This was also the first official year of the YSB Charitable Foundation. The Foundation built an energized team of volunteers and staff, and thanks to the generosity of the Ottawa community, was able to support many new initiatives that benefit YSB's clients.

At head office, YSB's central services oversaw the agency's financial and human resources, IT infrastructure, communications, and continuous quality improvement. YSB's programs and management

were given an enthusiastic thumbs-up by Children's Mental Health Ontario, which renewed YSB's accreditation for the next five years.

In a year of many successes, we were sad to see Alex Munter leave YSB after four years as executive director. Alex left the agency more visible, more united and more indispensable to youth and families in Ottawa. On behalf of the board and staff, I want to extend a heartfelt thank you to Alex for his leadership and his dedication.

It's also my pleasure to warmly welcome our new executive director, Joanne Lowe. And finally, I want to acknowledge the hard work of YSB staff, the support of funders and donors, and the dedication of the Board of Directors. Together, we'll keep YSB ready and able to meet the challenges and changes of the coming year.

YSB EmploymentServices



Young parents increase their chances of supporting themselves and their families through the Young Parent Employment Program. Many of the participants, mostly young single mothers, were previously receiving social assistance. With a bit of help and training, these young mothers are moving towards finding a meaningfu career.

Helping young people and families in Ottawafindemployment is an important part of YSB's mandate. We offer a suite of employment programs, serving youth from low-income neighbourhoods, students, adults, and displaced hi-tech workers.

Last year, YSB launched the Young Parent Employment Program. Through hands-on workshops and 16 weeks of on-the-job work experience, we helped young parents increase their chances of supportingthemselvesandtheirfamilies. This first-of-its-kind program was delivered in partnership with the Youville Centre.

Green jobs are an important part of a sustainable future. This year we hosted a Green Job Fair for youth looking for work in this growing sector. Over 550 youth and over 25 employers attended this

eventwhereyouth found employment, learned about green businesses, and found out how to "green" their resumes for the jobs of tomorrow.

YSB's Summer Jobs Service and Youth Opportunities Strategyprogramsonceagainexceededourtargets, helping students and youth from low-income neighbourhoods get a foot in the door towards long-term success. The restructuring of the Employment Ontario program saw our agency welcoming new clients and provided us with new tools to serve both youth and families in the Ottawa area.

One of our employment counsellors now works full time with youth in conflict with the law through the YSB Youth Justice program to help them learn life skills, write a resume, and practice interview techniques. This is an important part of the community reintegration program for young offenders.

Mental Health Services

THIS PAST YEAR, YSB made positive changes in its mental health services to better meet the needs of youth and families. It was a year of innovation in programs, service delivery and community collaboration.

YSB offers a 24/7 Crisis Line for Eastern Ontario, a mobile crisis team for Ottawa residents, and a residential unit for short stays (up to 5 days). Our comprehensive counseling services include individual and family sessions, as well asintensiveservicessoyouth and families can get the support they need.



This year, we created the Youth Mental Health Hub at 2301 Carling Avenue. We brought together many of our mental health services in one place that is both accessible for clients and makes it easier for our teams to coordinate their work.

To shorten wait times, serve more youth and families, and be there when we're most needed, we launched the YSB Youth Mental Health Walk-in Clinic. This one-of-its-kind walk-in clinic provides immediate counselling, and the response has shown that it's filling a real need.

This year we also signed a partnership to strengthen our collaboration with CHEO and the Royal Ottawa Health Care Group. This agreement confirms our organizations' commitment to collaboratively responding to the needs of youth in crisis.

We are also working with other mental health agencies to support the transition of youth to adult services. Another initiative, led by the Children's Aid Society of Ottawa, brings together mental health agencies and CHEO to develop and pilota different model for delivering services to children and youth with concurrent mental health and conduct issues.

(atie is a 15 year old who once struggled with depression and dropped out of school. Her YSB counsellor Susan helped her see the value in herself and turn things around. Dur youth justice staff keep it real when they are working with youth in custody. Developing trust is key. They also focus on education, offering special programs that develop empathy, selfawareness, life skills and practical skills for the job market.

YSB's YOUTH JUSTICE PROGRAMS

are designed to give young men who are in conflict with the law the building blocks to success. In 2010-2011, we developed and launched new programs to help our clients learn life skills, access employmentresources, and move towards a brighter future. Our youth justice programs include the William E. Hay and the Livius Sherwood custody facilities, angermanagement, community re-integration, employment and mental health services, and our mental health court worker program.

In partnership with the Ottawa Catholic School Board, we deliver a school program where our clients earn high school credits. Youth not only attend class regularly, they also learn skills such as drywalling, tiling,

allengine repair, and horticulture. Youth also get support esume building, interview skills, and pre-employment vices.

Frainers from Youcan (Youth Organizing to Understand affict and Advocate Nonviolence) from the University of tawa's St Paul's Campus provided training to our youth in ss-cultural conflict resolution, negotiation, peer helping a mediation. Recognizing that the lack of or a negative ner figure impacts on the development of character in ang men, we introduced a Young Offender Character velopment Curriculum to develop the skills our clients and to make responsible choices.

Jnderstanding that mental health plays a role in the ath justice system, we co-hosted the first Ottawa Child JYouth Mental Health Conference that brought together ressionals from mental health, justice, crime prevention, plic health and education, to learn best practices. To build strong and trusting relationships, we co-hosted first annual Probation Volleyball Tournament for phation officers and youth. This tournament proved to atremendous successand helpedall parties work together ree effectively.

community service

2010-2011 was a YEAR of both building and tearing down walls in the community. Building walls, the YSB Downtown Drop-in was renovated to better serve the needs of our clients. Youth launched the renovation by taking part in a wall demolition in September 2010 and were back for the re-opening celebration in March 2011.

Openingthenew,improved Drop-in was a reason to celebrate, because it's a life-changingfacility—onewhere street-involvedyouthfeelsafe, comfortable, and have a sense of belonging. Youth come in because they feel safe, and stay because of the services. The Drop-inteamoffersaddictions

counselling, mental health support, an easy-to-access walk in clinic, peer education programs, HIV and Hepatitis C prevention, and many community programs.

Tearing downwalls, we are working to make our service more accessible to the community we serve. We relaunched the Michelle Heights community out reach program based on a diverse inclusion model, which means that youth work to bring services, power, and voice to multi-race communities and cultures. Eight youth were hired and trained to provide this leadership and host a Communit Family Day.

Our health services program is exceeding expectations and street-involved you that eincreasingly using the primar health care clinic, learning about HIV/AIDS and Hepatiti C prevention, and visiting the dental hygiene program.

Youth homelessness continues to be a serious concernin Ottawa. Both of our young women's and young men' emergencyshelters are seeing an increase in the number cyouth coming to their doors. These youth, however, are spending less time in the shelter than in previous years. Our shelters operate, on average, at 106% capacity.



Both Yves' parents were killed during the Rwandan genocide, leaving him with an aunt who cared for many other children. While Yves was visiting Canada for a running competition in 2010, his quardian in Rwanda was being threatened. Fearing for his life, he decided to stay and found his way to the YSB Young Men's Emergency Shelter. Today, he is competing nationally in long-distance running

YSB's youth advisors say their work is about empowerment, equality and role modelling, and that it changes lives. It's a bridge between youth who use our services and the adults who provide them.

It was a very busy year fortheYouthEngagement program, working with both youth and adults in the community. Over 4,000 people participated in youth engagement activities during the past year, and youth volunteered over 4,300 hours.

Throughout the year, members of YSB's youth advisory committees worked on projects such as assessing the needs of particular groups of youth, participating inhealth and mental health fairs in high schools, providing a youth

te in local, provincial and national forums, and planning cial events.

n partnership with the First United Church, youth anized a vigil on December 6 commemorating the ional Day of Action and Remembrance on Violence inst Women. Youth organized a "SHAG Cupid" event ich attracted over 50 participants on Valentine's Day to n about safer sex. Youth also hosted a "jaw-droppingly some" Rainbow Brown Bag Lunch discussion forum, litated by youth, to share knowledge with service viders about queer and trans youth issues.

his year, our youth were pleased to work with Children's ntal Health Ontario as they piloted a youth engagement reditation process. Through their work, youth helped set standardsforyouthengagement in the province. It should noted that YSB's youth engagement program passed the accreditation with a 100% rating.

Building a brighter future for youth



ONE YEAR AGO, we launched the newYSBCharitable Foundation with ambitious goals and a drive to both expand YSB's reach in the community and help more youth and families.

We are thankful to Ottawa's generouscommunityforstanding with us as we embarked on this journey and helping to make our inaugural year a real success.

When we first launched, a youngmannamedJohnnyshared his story. He lives in one of YSB's long-term housing programs. Living on the streets after leaving a negative home environment, suffering from a mental health disorder, and developing harmful coping mechanisms, Johnny's life changed when he walked into the front doors of YSB. At the event, he announced that he had accomplished something henever

thought he would: he graduated from high school.

Months later, a young woman named Raphaelle shared her experiences with addictions, homelessness, and mental health. Through YSB, she was able to get back on her feet, find a job, and go back to school. Today, she is not only a strong youth advocate, but a promising law student at the University of Ottawa.

We're fundraising not only for young people like Johnny and Raphaelle, but for the thousands of others in our community who share similar experiences.

This year, the Foundation was able to fundraise to help create a new and innovative Youth Mental Health Walk-in Clinic that provides immediate help to youth and families. Operating one day a week, the clinic waiting room is full and demand continues to grow. The Foundation was also able to help fund the reconstruction of the

YSB Downtown Drop-in—a life-changing program for at-risk and street-involved youth.

We accomplished a great deal this year but we didn't do it alone. We are thankful for the generous support from our donors, our community, and our youth. I want to personally thank our inaugural Board of Directors for their tremendous work shaping the YSB Charitable Foundation and helping link YSB's services to the community. I also want to thank our Executive Director, Janice Barresi, who has been the determined leader behind our accomplishments.

This year has been a success, and we're excited about the possibilities looking forward.

Impacting tomorrow through the YSB Charitable Foundation



YSB Downtown Drop-in youth kick off reconstruction of this life-changing facility

THOSE WHO LIVE in Ottawa are known for getting involved in their communities, helping their neighbours, and making their city a better place for the next generation. This is especially true when it comes to young people who need support to overcome challenges, make positive choices, and feel hope.

The city is changing. It is more youthful than before, with 25% of the population under 24 years old, it is more diverse than it used to be, and it is more populous than it used to be. As a result, we need to ensure that the reach, scope, and effectiveness of our services grow to meet changing demands.

Here are a few examples of how Ottawa's community has helped us to adapt.

HELP FOR MENTAL HEALTH WHEN IT'S NEEDED MOST

To provide immediate help to youth and families struggling with a mental health disorder, we opened a new Youth Mental Health Walk-in Clinic. Research from similar models in other cities suggested that the clinic would reduce overall wait times, serve

more youth, and help families navigate what can be a complex mental health system. One in 5 young people in Ontario suffers from a mental health disorder.

With the help of individual donors, community groups, and corporate donors, we are able to offer this service one day a week. Demand continues to increase, and the clinic's waiting room is often overflowing. Moving forward, we hope to be able to fundraise to offer the service more frequently.

FROM LIFE ON THE STREETS TO HOPE

The YSB Downtown Dropin was housed in a 60-year-old former fur storage facility. This lifeline for thousands of street-involved youth needed a major make-over to be made more welcoming, more suited to youth programming, and able to help moreyouthpermanentlymoveoff thestreets. In Canada, there are an estimated 65,000 homeless youth. Here in Ottawa, the YSB Drop-in serves over 1,500 youth.

Youth who use the Dropin launched the renovation by proudly tearing down a wall that would be turned into a oneon-one counselling room. They joined many individual and corporate donors who helped transform this space. The site now has improved group counselling space, easier access to a primary health clinic, better shower and laundry facilities, and a new food bank.

GIFTS THAT MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Economic barriers have an impact on the well-being of many youth and families. Being able to afford bus passes for job interviewsorgroceriesforafamily meal are things that many of us takeforgrantedbutotherscannot afford. Thanks to thousands of donors, we were able to provide holiday gifts to youth living in our long-term housing, grocery gift cards, post-secondary education scholarships, donated hockey tickets for families in counselling, nutritious lunch for streetinvolved youth, and more.

GIVING YOUTH THE SKILLS TO MOVE ON

We believe that every young person deserves a chance at a better tomorrow. This is why YSB provides youth in conflict with the law the skills they need to move ahead and not find themselves back in court. This year, we funded a youth drumming program at the William E. Hay Centre. Thanks to generous support by donors, the program teaches youth positive communications skills and conflict resolution.

Our Quality Commitment

EVERY STAFF MEMBER at YSB is involved in quality assurance. Simply put, this means that that we keep track of our clients, the services they receive, the impact of our services on their well-being, and how they feltabout their experience with YSB. Why? So that we can see whether ourprogramsworkastheyareintended; we can learn from unexpected successes and challenges; and we can constantly improve our services.

Accredited by CMHO

YSB is accredited by Children's Mental Health Ontario (CMHO), meaning that our clinical programs and our whole agency have met standards related to mental health services for youth. Every four years, CMHO reviews our accreditation. In the fall of 2010, three professional reviewers spent a week at YSB, looking into every aspect of our services and management as an agency. They renewed YSB's accreditation with flying colours.
